Are you working regularly with children?

If so you must have attended an Archdiocese of Louisville Safe Environment Training.

You must also have a satisfactory background check not older than 5 years.

See your Safe Environment Coordinator today to verify your compliance!

## KENTUCKY LEADERS GET TOUGHER ON SEXUAL EXPLICIT MATERIAL INVOLVING MINORS.

This month in Frankfort, Kentucky Governor Andy Beshear signed into law House Bill 254 that increased the penalty for possessing, viewing or wantonly distributing matter portraying a sexual performance by a minor under the age of 12 years to a class C felony. The measure was brought forth by Representative Derek Lewis of London. Under the provisions of HB 254, offenders who wantonly distribute this matter will be charged with a class C felony for the first offense, and a class B felony for each subsequent offense.

"As a father, this issue is particularly meaningful because we know that child sexual abuse exists in epidemic proportions. These materials normalize sick, inhumane acts, further victimize young children and cause irreparable harm to our most vulnerable," Lewis said. "HB 254 helps us fight child abuse and human trafficking, it is high time

we stepped up to provide law enforcement with more resources."

Representative Lewis also offered his appreciation to Heather Wagers who oversees the Office of Trafficking and Abuse Prevention and Prosecution in Attorney General Daniel Cameron's Office.

"We are committed to fighting back against child exploitation in Kentucky, and the bipartisan passage of House Bill 254 allows us to further protect Kentucky's children by enhancing penalties against predators who possess, view, or distribute child sexual abuse material of a minor under 12," said Attorney General Cameron. "I appreciate the work of Representative Derek Lewis, each of the bill's co-sponsors, and members of the House of Representatives for unanimously passing this important piece of legislation."

## HOW CHILDREN ARE EFFECTED BY SEXUAL ABUSE

Children are individuals, and each is affected differently by abuse. A number of people could have the trauma of sexual abuse occur in their lives, but each individual will

respond and react in varying ways according to his or her personality, family of origin, support systems, gender, age at the time of the abuse, and many other

variables too numerous to list. Other factors that impact the magnitude of the damage include duration of abuse, level of intrusiveness/violation of the abuse, type and severity of threats used to maintain secrecy, relationship to the abuser, the

number of perpetrators, and age at the time of disclosure as well as reactions to disclosure. It is never appropriate to try to predict how a child may be affected by sexual

abuse. What someone may deem "mild" sexual abuse may traumatize a child the rest of his or her life. Another child that suffered from what others may describe

as "severe" abuse, may, with proper care, heal and live a healthy and productive life. The effects of abuse are unpredictable, and all individuals need support and compassion as they find their

unique paths to healing.

## **EFFECTS OF ABUSE ON CHILDREN**

The younger the age of the child at the onset and the longer the duration of the sexual abuse, the more severe are the effects of sexual abuse.

The closer the relationship of the child to the abuser, the larger the impact on the child.

Negative and non-supportive reactions from persons to whom children disclose (disbelief, denial, making excuses) cause negative effects on how the children respond as well as on their healing process.

We must heed God's call to care for the most vulnerable among us and to continue our efforts toward wholeness and health in dealing with sexual abuse.

## WHAT TO DO WHEN A CHILD DISCLOSES ABUSE TO YOU

It is highly unlikely for children to make false allegations of sexual abuse. Therefore, when a child reports incidences of abuse or other suspicious behavior, we should presume the child is telling the truth. Children are more likely to report abuse when they know their telling will lead to protection. In some cases.

the abuse cannot be substantiated. An unsubstantiated disclosure does not mean that the child is being untruthful. Rather, it means that there is not enough collaborating evidence to support the child's story. Recanting is also predictable when a child discloses. Some children recant their disclosures

when parents get upset, police are called, crisis escalates, or loss occurs. It is eerie for a child when the things occur that the abuser foretold, which can prompt the child to recant. Below are some helpful hints to help guide you should a child disclose abuse.



Respond by being honest and direct. Acknowledge the child's courage in disclosing and ask what it is he or she hopes will happen. Provide the child with as much information as possible and allow the child some age appropriate choices about the process.

Assure the child that you will do everything possible to keep him or her safe. When children accidentally disclose, know that they will be much more fearful than children who purposefully disclose. Children who accidentally disclose are highly reluctant for the information to be passed on any further. Be empathic about their reluctance, while letting them know that you must follow the law.

<u>Inform children of the law, of your legal obligations</u>, and of the reporting process. In some instances, explaining that you have a legal obligation to report the information relieves the child that he or she is not responsible for breaking the silence.

<u>Don't make promises you can't keep.</u> Children who disclose often begin by testing you. They share parts of their story without giving all the details. It is not your job to investigate or substantiate what happened. Rather your response-ability is to make a report to those who are trained to decide whether or not to investigate. Details of the abuse are not necessary in making a report. Praise the child's courage for telling you and explain that you will do your best to protect him or her. Do not, however, make promises that you cannot keep.

These are just a few recommendations Remember Kentucky is a mandatory reporting state and you MUST report any suspicious abuse by calling 1-877-KY-SAFE1 or reaching out to local law enforcement. If you answered "wait until the I either talk to John's parent's or they pick him up", you are correct! Page 37 of the code of conduct states "Release young people only to parents or guardians, unless the parent or guardian has provided permission allowing release to another adult."
